You founded Quest Church in Seattle, and the global antipoverty movement One Day's Wages, yet you confess to being more in love with the *idea* of changing the world than with actually doing that which will bring about change. How did you come to that realization, in spite of the effective justice work you've been doing?

Why do you think the current generation may be "the most overrated in human history"?

You say many Christians have an "unrealistic and glamorous perception of what it means to follow Christ and to pursue justice." Talk about that unrealistic perception.

How do you respond to criticism that you focus too much on justice and not enough on Jesus?

Tell us about the "Jesus of downward mobility."

What was the catalyst for founding One Day's Wages?

You and your wife, Minhee, felt called to give up an entire year's salary. How did you and your family work to make that happen?

You're very honest about your own misplaced zeal: did you really list your family home for rent without telling your wife?

Is it possible for do-gooders to do more harm than good? To do justice, unjustly?

What's wrong with people jumping on a bandwagon for the latest, hottest, sexy cause, such as building water wells in Africa?

Why are you critical of for-profit companies like TOMS Shoes and Bob's (a Skechers brand) that provide shoes to people in the developing world for each pair sold?

You admit to liking your stuff. Do you still miss your convertible sports car, "Blue Thunder"?

Your family emigrated from Korea when you were six years old. How did the immigrant experience shape you?

When you think about the courage, tenacity and fortitude of your parents, do you worry that your own children aren't being shaped in those values, growing up as they do in a culture of opportunity?

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
